Mission Statement:

The mission of the criminal and restorative justice program is to study the nature of criminal behavior and its causes, to study the workings of the criminal justice system, to understand the nature of restorative justice, and to reflect on the relationship between Christian faith (both belief and practice) and the criminal justice system.

Program Goals:

- Goal 1: Provide students with a sound understanding of how the criminal justice system functions.
- Goal 2: Examine the sociology of crime and criminal behavior.
- Goal 3: Students will explore differing conceptions of justice with a special focus on a restorative conception of justice.
- Goal 4: Students will examine the intersection of Christianity, ethics, and the criminal justice system.
