## **Taking the Reins**

### MANAGEMENT STUDIES GRADUATE, CINDY WILSON '93, NAMED CHAIR OF DEPARTMENT OF BUSINESS & TECHNOLOGIES

**CINDY WILSON'S** entrepreneurial instincts and unwillingness to quit at anything she begins trace back to grandparents, parents, and professional mentors who saw the promise within her and modeled for her what it meant to make the most of every opportunity. Her grandparents on her mother's side were entrepreneurs who owned and operated restaurants and hotels, while her father's parents worked in manufacturing, blue collar work in factories, the kind of work that challenges the strongest of spirits.

"I've been blessed by extraordinary mentors," said Wilson, who recently was appointed to the position of Chair of the Department of Business and Technologies after 13 years as Director of Management Studies and 32 years at the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company. "God has been very good to me. My career has been a natural progression and I've been able to take something from every stop to shape who I am today."

A native of Akron, Wilson went to work at Goodyear just days after graduation. It was the beginning of a career that led her to serve in positions in finance, human resources, expatriate services, corporate information technology, and IT project management. Each position provided her with more learning, growth, and opportunity.

Wilson's introduction to Malone came as a student when she signed up for the Management Studies program after earning an associate's degree from the University of Akron. "It was my husband, Ed, who recommended the program," said Wilson. "He earned it while working in law enforcement and knew it was something I could do while working. I completed the program in 1993, a member of cohort number 52. I have a paperweight that is engraved 'Malone Class M-52, 1993.' It has a place on my desk."

Wilson did not know at that time that she would return to Malone as an adjunct faculty member in the program in 2002 and later be asked to serve as Director of Management Studies in 2007. She has been at Malone ever since.



Her own experience in the program allowed her to relate to the adult learners who were balancing work and family responsibilities while working toward their degree.

"I sat in their seats," said Wilson. "I lived their days. I can relate to them. I understood what it meant to balance

competing demands on your time. I'm so proud of the degree completion program. It has helped so many people live out their lifelong dream of earning a college degree."

Wilson, who also earned an Executive MBA from Baldwin-Wallace University, was named chair in 2020. While still new to her position as chair, Wilson has already worked with faculty to launch three new specializations in the MBA program, restructure the way the degree completion program is offered, and launched new academic programs.



### MALONE EXPERIENCE AND CONNECTIONS PREPARED PAM BURCH FOR LIFE OF SERVICE

For **PAM (HUFF) BURCH `77**, receiving an education degree led to much more than teaching. She married **DAVID BURCH `77** soon after graduation and the two moved to Port St. Lucie, Florida to help plant Morningside Friends Church. For eight years, Pam also taught sixth grade before being approached by a State Farm agency manager about the possibility of owning her own business.

Malone had a tremendous impact on my career and family life. I often feel like I did not choose Malone, but Malone chose me.

"The idea of opening my own business was the farthest thing from my imagination at that time," she said. "I had always wanted to be a teacher, but God had a different plan."

Burch opened her office in 1985 and has worked for State Farm Insurance since then.

"Malone had a tremendous impact on my career and family life," she said. "I often feel like I did not choose Malone, but Malone chose me." Admissions Counselor Jerry Chaplin '73 encouraged her to come to Malone after

meeting her at a college fair, and continued to help her throughout her college career. "It was Jerry's attention and Christ-likeness, as well as others who represented the University, who helped me develop courage and confidence." Burch remembers **Eugene Collins '56**, professor of biblical studies emeritus, asking challenging questions in the classroom that helped her think critically and define her beliefs. His influence guided her to share her faith with boldness. It was also on a freshman trip to his home where she would meet her husband.

"I have great memories of Malone and have maintained many relationships from those days over the years," she said.

David Burch's family has many ties to Malone. His parents, Rev. Bruce and Cora Mae Burch, were influenced by Malone leadership including **Everett Cattell, Robert Hess, Eugene Collins, Lucy Anderson**, and **Ronald Johnson \*64**. Rev. Burch was a Friends pastor who led the way for young adults to become Pioneers, believing many future leaders would come from Malone. Several Burch family members also attended Malone, including **Libby Burch-Brinkman '75, Rev. Douglas '82** and **Sandra '81 (Hanna) Burch, Megan (Burch) '10** and **Jereme '09 Proudman, Kaitlin (Burch) Schneider '18, Bridget Brinkman-Patesel \*06, and <b>Lydia (Burch) Luke \*15**.

Pam and David continue to give to Malone financially, and she has also served as a member of the Board of Trustees. In doing so, they help students strengthen their faith and discover Christ's calling on their lives.

"David and I are blessed to have daughters and sonin-laws who love and serve Christ," she said. "My prayer is that Malone will continue to influence future generations to stand firm in their faith."


